Learning Strategies

Course Description

Learning Strategies is a 5 credit course which follows a locally developed curriculum. Students may gain credit for Learning Strategies 15, 25 and 35.

The five major topics include:

- Understanding Yourself as a Learner
- Organizational Management
- Study Skills
- Self Advocacy
- Preparing for Evaluation

Students meet in Learning Strategies for an 80 minute class every other day for an entire year.

This course is intended to help students with a variety of learning needs become successful at Strathcona. Students are included in regular classes and are subject to the same outcomes and expectations as all other students.

Learning Strategies will give students the opportunity to use class time to complete homework or to write exams that need additional time. In addition, students will learn strategies that will assist their learning styles.

Who has access to Learning Strategies?

- Students who have been coded for a variety of special needs
- Students who are not finding academic success
- Students who have lost their funding in Junior High but still need learning assistance

Who is eligible for test accommodations?
